- 215 Activities available to attendees included: Exhibits, Family Wildlife Adventure Day, Silent Auction, Birding and Wildlife Field Trips and Classroom Presentations, Keynotes, and Photo Classroom and Field Workshops. Festival attendees visited a wide variety of birding and wildlife sites, including Merritt Island National Wildlife Refuge, Canaveral National Seashore and Brevard County Environmentally Endangered Lands Sanctuaries. Private Festival Tours were conducted on lands protected by the St. Johns River Water Management District and Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission as well as a restricted access area inside the Kennedy Space Center.
- 1782 session seats were filled by 950 individual participants (these counts refer only to sessions requiring enrollment for participation). A total of 4464 session seats were available. The most underattended opportunities were those classroom activities that were held in the Auditorium as 150 seats were allocated for each and the average usage was about 15%. It is recommended that the seat allocation for the auditorium be reduced from 150 to 100 for the keynotes and to 30 for the regular classroom and spotlight sessions. This would reduce the total number of session seats to 3174 and make the average usage in the Auditorium about 44%.
- 27 sessions sold out, and 4 sessions had only 1 seat left open.
- 107 Field Trip Leaders/Speakers provided their time, talent and effort to bring quality information and field trip excitement to each participant who went by bus or carpool.
  - 1. 44 presenters gave 53 talks during the festival.
  - 2. There were 4 Keynote speakers.
  - 3. 16 workshops were provided.
  - 4. 85 Field Trip Leaders conducted 112 field trips and workshops. 12 of those were on Brevard County Environmentally Endangered Lands properties.
- 6 professional photographers conducted 31 sessions and 2 Photography Industry Representatives
  conducted 3 sessions. Registered participants filled 212 seats in these 34 sessions. Learning
  experiences ranged from classroom presentations on how to use and feel comfortable with your
  camera, to improve photography skills, to advanced techniques and THEN, field workshops with handson functions to help capture the essence and thrill of creating a lasting image with historical and
  emotional value.
- 69 Businesses/Organizations filled the 82 available Exhibit booths (Additional booth workers who helped = 120)

An estimated 1650 people participated in some level of Festival activities during Jan 22-27, 2020. This is based on exhibit hall attendance, volunteers/field trip leaders/speakers, exhibitors, attendees and suppliers.

## BIRD SPECIES SEEN ON FIELD TRIPS, FIELD WORKSHOPS & BOAT TRIPS DURING THE 2020 FESTIVAL:

One hundred and eighty-nine species of birds were seen on the 2020 Space Coast Birding and Wildlife Festival field trips and boat trips, including a suite of Florida specialty birds: Snail Kite, Short-tailed Hawk, Purple Swamphen, Purple Gallinule, Black-bellied and Fulvous Whistling Ducks, Red-cockaded Woodpecker, Bachman's Sparrow, Brown-headed Nuthatch and Florida Scrub-Jay. In all, twenty-one species of ducks and twenty-one species of shorebirds were tallied. In the "Colorful Birds of North America" category, none is more spectacular than the rainbow-hued Painted Bunting with the brilliant bright red Vermillion Flycatcher a close second. Both were observed at the Lake Apopka Restoration Area. Hundreds of manatees, loads of Limpkins and Purple Gallinules were seen at Blue Spring State Park and on its associated St Johns River boat trip. Space Coast Birding and Wildlife Festival guests were extremely happy with the birds they encountered, the quality of the field trips and leaders, the expertise of the speakers and the variety of exhibitors, who came from all over the world.
